001 Nabae Beach
A beach at the gateway to the Uchiura Peninsula, west of Takahama. Cars can drive onto the beach.

002 Ebisuhama Park Beach

A well-kept Takahama secret, this beach is recommended for those craving quiet seaside relaxation.



003 Isaribiso (Candle Illumination festival)
Myriad candles lit by townspeople on the beaches and in the streets paint the Takahama night in soft and magical colors.

004 Yagura Dragon

A creative fireworks display organized by local young people and held on the same day as Isaribiso. It features the simultaneous launch of 300,000 small fireworks.



005 Fishing pier
A safe and pleasant fishing area close to Takahama fishing port.

006 Otomi cliffs

These splendid 260m-high cliffs are designated as one of Fukui Prefecture's most scenic spots.



007 Uchiura red peppers
You can try your hand at making wreaths from red peppers, a local Takahama specialty, or an edible table decoration.

008 "Dokoiko! Nanishiyo!" mini-tours

Local residents guide visitors around this seaside town in an immersive mini-tour.



009 Aoba Fureai Dome
You can enjoy croquet-like "gate ball," futsal and more at this multi-purpose indoor sports facility at the foot of Mt. Aoba. TEL 0770-72-3133

010 Marine sports

You can enjoy surfing and other marine sports year round in the waters around Takahama.



011 Mt. Aoba
Also known as "Wakasa's Mt. Fuji," the mountain trails of this beautiful 693m-high mountain attract many climbers.

012 Aobayama Herbal Village

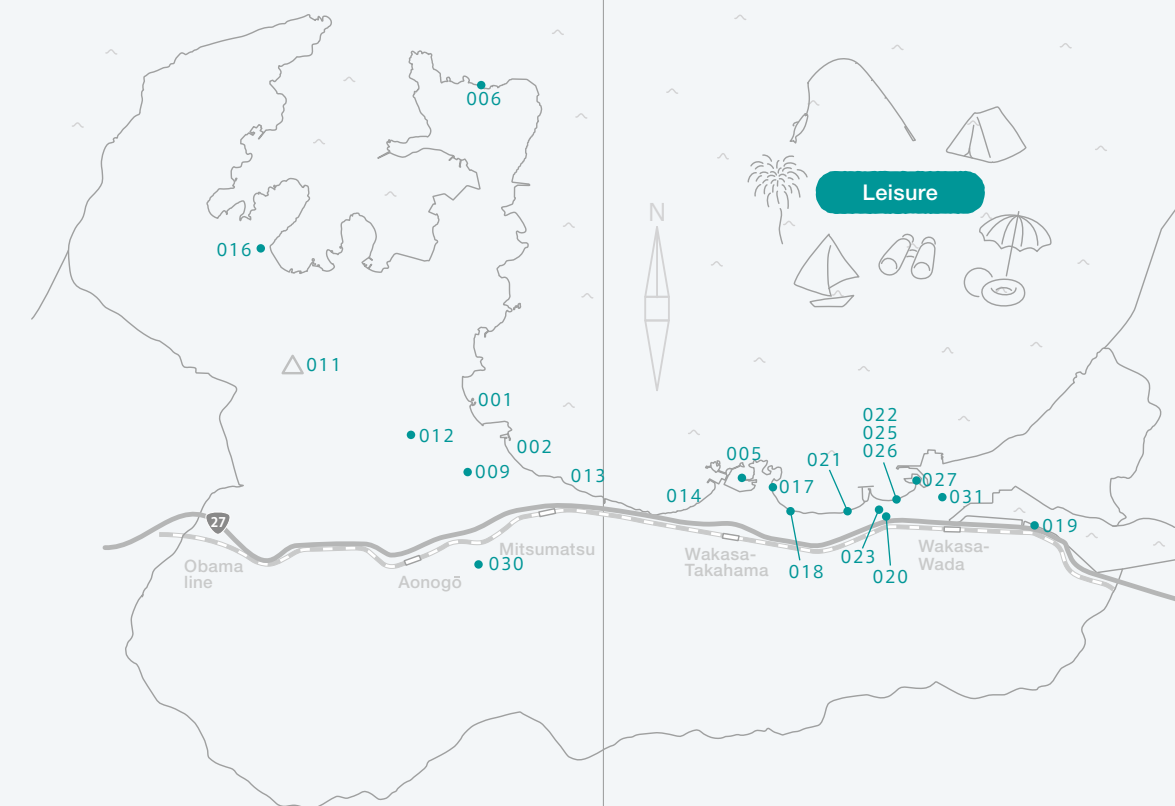

013 Hamanasu Park Beach
A wide sandy beach with a view of majestic Mt. Aoba. The 2,500 pine trees and Japanese beach roses planted along the promenade make it a great place for a stroll.

014 Wakamiya Beach

Located west of Takahama's fishing port, this beach is perfect for a full day of family fun.



015 Mt. Aoba mountain-climbing and hiking trails
The mountain path from Shiroyama offers a 12km hiking trail as part of the Kinki Nature Trail.

016 Hirose Auto Campsite

Campsite in Goshikiyama Park with space for 45 camper vans. Get your fix of nature with panoramic views of the beautiful sea below.

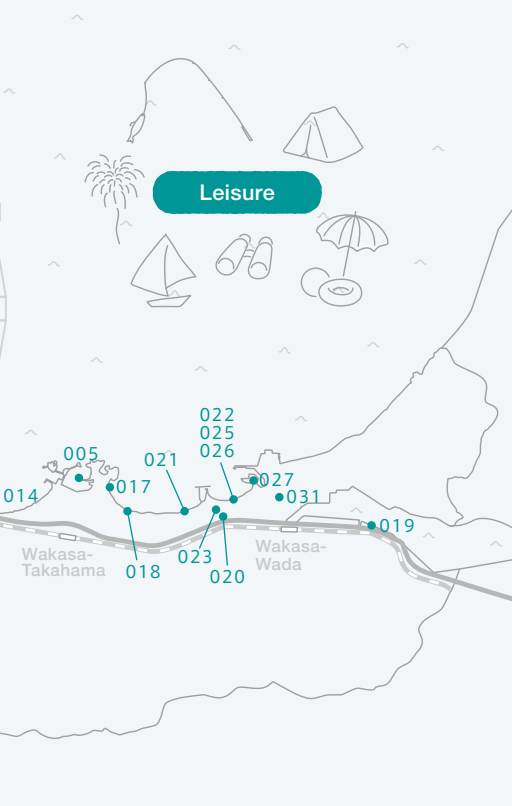

017 Shiroyama Beach
A sheltered bay with calm water, close to Shiroyama Park.

018 Toriihama Beach

A relaxing beach with clear blue waters, located between Shiroyama and Shirahama.



019 Michi-no-Eki Seaside Takahama rest area
This facility along National Route 27 offers hot bathing, souvenir and other shopping, a restaurant, rest area and local information.

020 Suminagashi paper marbling experience
The suminagashi tradition going back over 1000 years is thought to have its roots here in Fukui. Subtle differences in the positioning of the ink in the water, how the ink spreads, airflow, etc. mean the pattern on the paper is never the same. After the pattern is transferred onto Japanese paper you can add writing or lettering of your choice.



021 Shirahama Beach
The beautiful white sands of this beach live up to its name. Situated on the west side of Wakasa Wada, and fringed by the Aonomatsubara pine grove.

022 Wakasa Wada Beach

This beach was awarded international Blue Flag status in April 2016. Young people and families flock to its wide sandy beach and endless blue shallow waters.



023 Wada Campsite (Aonomatsubara)
In summer, this pine grove fronting Wakasa Bay and running 1km from Wakasa Wada to Shirahama Beach is used as a swimming beach and campsite.

024 Wakasa-Takahama Fireworks Display

The town's annual fireworks display takes place on August 1. Fireworks of all shapes, sizes and colors shoot up in unison from the water into the sky in a powerful spectacle.



025 Stand-up paddleboarding (SUP) experience
Beginners welcome! Instructors will give you a clear and simple introduction to SUP, and once you've got the hang of using the paddle, you're ready to go out onto the beautiful clear ocean! Equipment and life-jackets are available for hire.

026 SUP Yoga

The best part about experiencing SUP yoga in Takahama is being able to do it in the beautiful natural surroundings. Enjoy the ultimate in mind and body relaxation at a gorgeous Blue Flag-certified beach.



027 Hamanasu Park / Hamanasu BBQ Park
The town's floral symbol, the Japanese beach rose, grows in this park. Its grassy open spaces offer fantastic views of Mt. Aoba. In summer you can have BBQs here (advance reservation required) TEL 0770-72-0070

028 Beach Rugby Chubu tournament

The Chubu round of Beach Rugby is held on Wada Beach. The tournament-style event features some exciting battles.



029 Hisatomi Fisheries ferry
The ferry takes visitors out into Uchiura Bay for raft-fishing, shore-fishing and more. 8-19 Konoura, Takahama TEL 0770-76-1251

030 Zazen (seated Zen meditation) experience

Visitors can try zazen at Daijōji Temple in the tranquil mountain foothills. Daijōji is one of the Wakasa region's few temples of the Keninji branch of the Rinzai school of Zen Buddhism.



031 Akafun Boya
Takahama's town mascot Akafun Boya was born on November 10, 1988. This lively boy wears a red fundoshi loincloth.

032 Keifuku Maru, Fukui Fisheries

This fishing boat takes tourist out for sport fishing, octopus fishing and island-hopping. Come aboard and enjoy the ocean!

033 Shiroyama Park and Meikyodo Cave
The park is home to the ruins of Takahama Castle, said to have been built in the Muramachi Period. Nearby is Meikyodo, the largest sea cave of Takahama's 8 noted caves.

034 Nakayama-dera temple

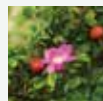
Built in 736 by the monk Taichō at the order of Emperor Shōmu. The temple is home to a Buddhist statue shown to the public only once every 33 years, and a nationally-designated Important Cultural Property.



035 The former Kyoto Dento Takahama Sales Office
This old-fashioned building constructed in 1931 has been designated as a national registered tangible cultural property.

036 The museum of fishing village culture and tradition

The only facility in the prefecture to give an overview of Wakasa fishery culture. You can also see works by painter-fisherman, the late Harujiro Kaii, and fishing equipment from the past.



037 Japanese beach rose
May is the best time to see this representative flower of Takahama. After blooming, both the red and white flowers develop bright-red fruit.

038 Takahama Nuclear Power Plant
Some of the power produced by Kansai Electric Power Co. (Kepco) is generated by the Takahama plant.



039 Kissaka fort ruins
Somewhere here on Mt. Aoba are the ruins of a legendary battery, in an unknown location inaccessible by car.

040 Hama-hiroi beach cleaning

Townpeople get together to clean up the local beaches. As well as gathering garbage together, the activity brings people together in their affection for the local area.



041 Goshikiyama Park
This natural park includes a camper van campsite offering the pleasures of both mountain and sea, and Hana-no-mori, an area of over 4,000 colorful flowers.

042 Hibiki Rice Terraces

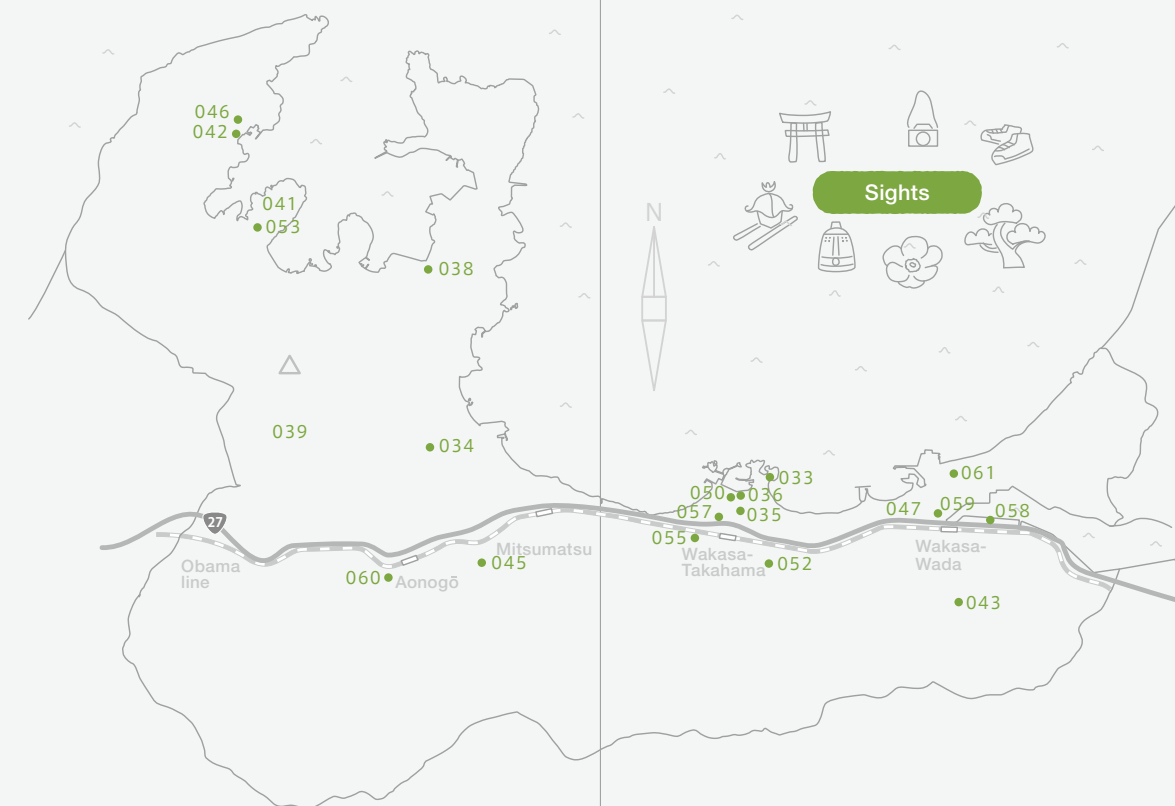
Chosen as one of Japan's top 100 terraced rice fields. These beautiful terraced paddy fields carved into the mountain-sides are divided into around 150 parcels of land.



043 Magoji Temple
Said to have been founded by Prince Shōtoku in 619, this is Fukui Prefecture's oldest temple. The gardens are famous for their cherry blossoms and autumn leaves. The temple houses an Important Cultural Property, a Buddhist statue only put on display once every 25 years.

044 Wooden writing tablets

Excavations at the ruins of Heijō Palace in Nara unearthed wooden writing tablets mentioning sushi, which provided evidence of sushi's ancient existence and caused a sensation in archaeological circles.



045 Daijoji Temple
Visitors can experience zazen seated meditation (Zen practice) at Daijoji, one of the Wakasa region's few temples of the Rinzai Kennin-ji school of Buddhism.

046 Shorakuji Temple

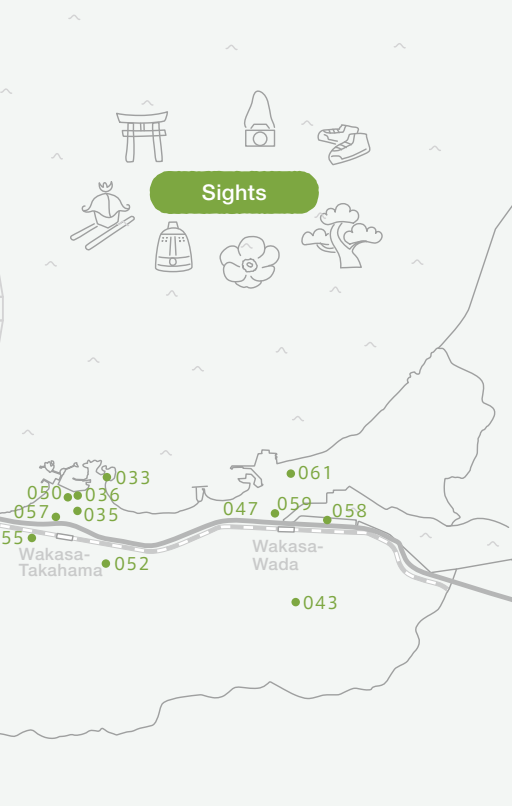
A quiet mountain temple founded in 764 by the Buddhist priest Gyōki.



047 Wada no Roji alleyways
In the mid-Showa period, these alleys were lined with over 30 summer villas belonging to Kyoto merchants. You can still walk around and enjoy the lingering traditional atmosphere of this old seaside resort area.

048 Hamanasu Marathon

The marathon is held every fall. Participants run in the autumn breeze along a flat course centering around the picturesque seafront promenade.



049 The old Tango Highway
From the Nara period onwards this highway connecting Wakasa with the capital saw the transportation of cultural materials, salt, seafoods and agricultural produce.

050 Bōkyō no ishi/akari (Stone/Lamps of Homesickness)
This monument is a mark of friendship between Takahama and its sister city Shika (Ishikawa Prefecture). About 380 years ago, fishermen from Takahama arrived in Shika, and began to fish and build villages. Exchange between the two towns has been ongoing now for over 20 years.



051 Shrines aplenty
This region has long been strongly influenced by continental Asian culture, leaving a historical heritage in the shape of numerous shrines, temples and aspects of traditional culture.

052 Shichinen Matsuri festival

An occasional festival at Sakichi Shrine, put on for the whole of the old Takahama region community. Held every 7 years, it is the biggest summer festival in the Wakasa region. Highlights include the parading of a mikoshi portable shrine, and a dedicatory children's kabuki performance.



053 Takumi Art Museum

Located in the grounds of Goshikiyama Park, the museum exhibits a variety of arts and crafts including Japanese paintings, Western paintings, sculptures and wooden works of art, as well as works by local artists. TEL 0770-76-1641

054 Fishing village

The Shiodo district, long the center of the local fishing industry, is a maze of extremely narrow alleyways. The barometers dotted here and there are peculiar to fishing villages.



055 Takahama Folk Museum

A rich repository of Takahama culture and history, including arts and crafts, folk culture materials, authentic items from the Jomon period, folklore and traditional performing arts. TEL 0770-72-5270

056 Komainu guardian statues

Just looking at the different styles of old and new lion-dog guardian statues at the town's shrines is enjoyment enough. Even the severely-damaged ones are still in service.



057 Takahama Town Hall

The Town Hall at the heart of the town supports all aspects of local life, from administrative activity and policy to the organization of events, announcements/notifications, and more.



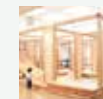
058 Wakasa-Takahama Eldoland

In this fascinating interactive science theme park, themed zones teach visitors the importance of energy and science.



059 kurumu

The playroom of this childcare support service is a peaceful space filled with light and smelling of wood. Located on the first floor of the Takahama-cho Hoken Fukushi Center (health and welfare center), kurumu is designed to encourage children's motor skills and physical growth.



060 Yokotsumi-noen Picnic

In mid April to early May, the fields of Yokotsumi are blanketed in 70,000 shiba-sakura (moss phlox) flowers in pink and lilac. Local volunteers do the planting and running of the event.



061 Azuchiyama Park

Mt. Azuchi is a gentle 80m-high mountain. The observation deck at the summit gives a sweeping view of the beautiful beaches with their endless white sands.





062 Wakasa fugu blowfish and crab dishes
Takahama faces the Sea of Japan. During fall and winter you can enjoy seafood delights like freshly-caught blowfish and crab.

063 "Etchan-zuke" pickles (Yamaguchi Ryokan)
Pickled cucumbers made to a secret recipe are pickled twice and additive-free. Once tasted, never forgotten!

064 Golden manju steamed buns with chestnut (Taisho-ya)

066 Genroku Mochi rice cakes (Genroku Mochi)

068 Wakasa-Takahama sushi
Various sorts of sushi developed in Takahama, which is historically associated with sushi, and make full use of local ingredients.

069 Yamabuki miso
Handmade miso with a rustic country taste. Time and effort goes into the slow maturation of this all-natural miso, made using soybeans from Takahama.



070 Blue Light Yokoyama
The Osaka-born owner opened this uniquely-monikered restaurant in his wife's hometown of Takahama. Food here is authentic yet casual, and dinner customers can enjoy natural wines with a varied à la carte menu that includes pâtés and terrines.

071 Bettei Tachida
Traditional Kyoto cuisine with a twist, served in a relaxed and elegant setting. As well as good-value lunches, in the evening the restaurant offers a reservation-recommended special dinner course. Diners are treated to a memorable experience in a luxurious setting with a view of the ocean.



072 Heshiko mackerel
A local method of pickling fish, in which mackerel is pickled in salt and then fermented in rice bran. It is ideal as a snack or with rice.

073 Wakasa Rusk (Mugiwara Boushi bread shop)
No ordinary rusk, this local specialty has a rich aroma from plentiful use of Hokkaido butter, and a wonderfully crispy snap.

082 Fukui kome-kama with blowfish skin (Otani Shōten)

083 Totucha herbal tea

This is an easy-drinking tonic for health and beauty. The main ingredient of tree bark has been prized since ancient times as a traditional Chinese medicine promoting longevity.



084 Meikyo sweets (Umezaki Japanese Sweets)
Famous for a sweet shaped like the Meikyodo cave. White bean paste is sandwiched in a egg-rich, milk-flavored dough and baked. TEL 0770-72-0248

085 Pain doré

Popular products here are the mini croissant and loaves of bread. Customers can eat in to better savor the offerings. Open from 10am.

089 Seaside strawberry fields Jolly Farm / Pappy Fruits Park

091 Komatsu Boat

At the first year-round beach café to open in Takahama, you can savor to the full the sea around Wakasa as you listen to sound of waves, season by season.

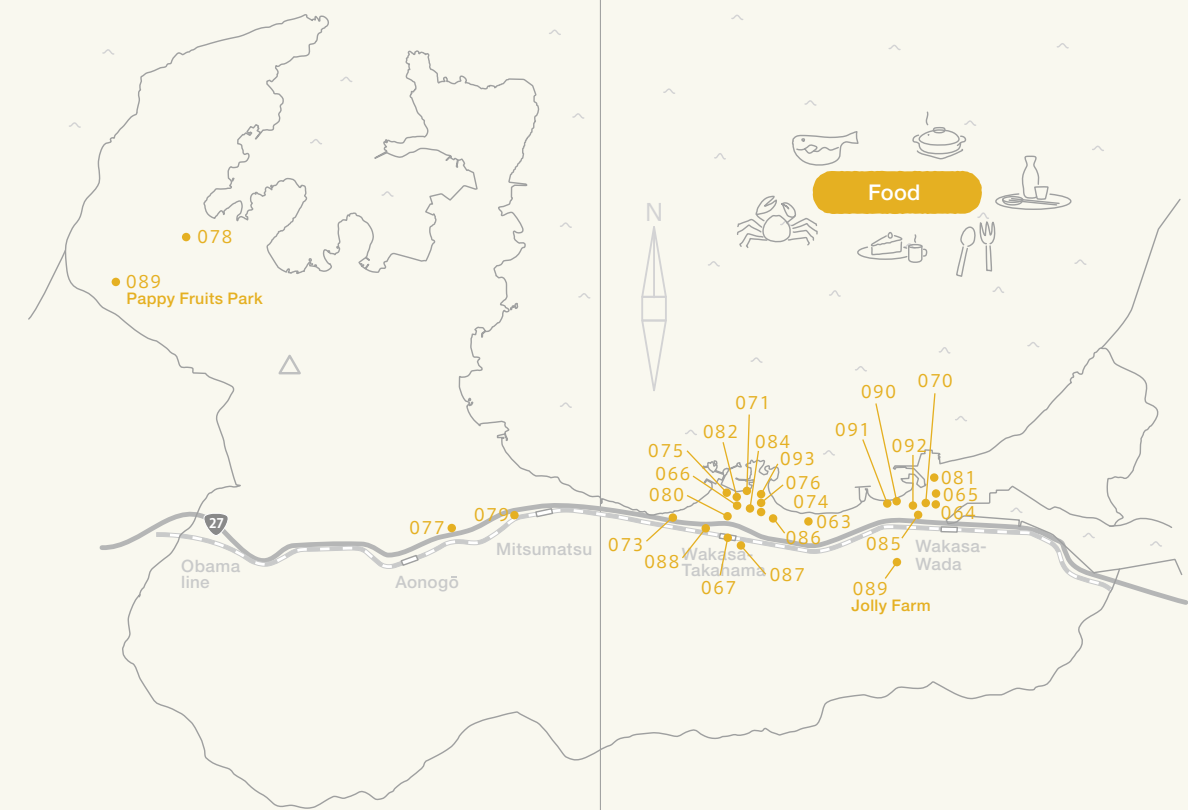


092 Moromi "solid" soy sauce (Sennariya Soy Sauce)

After chilling out on the grass, don't forget a photo in front of the **Meikyodo Cave**.

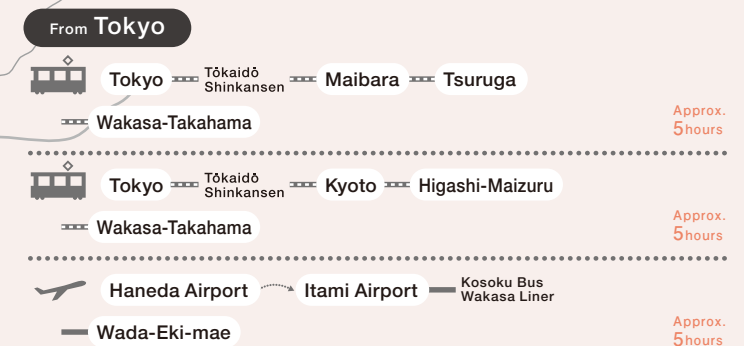
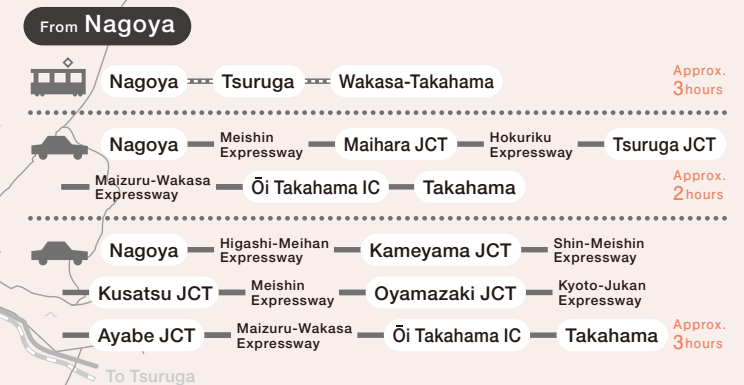
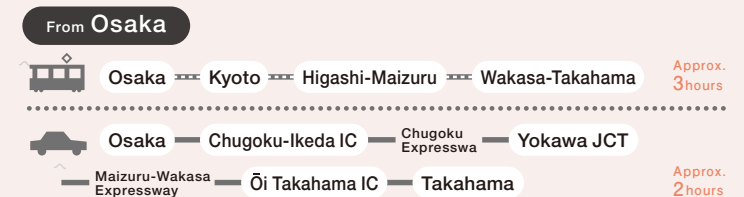
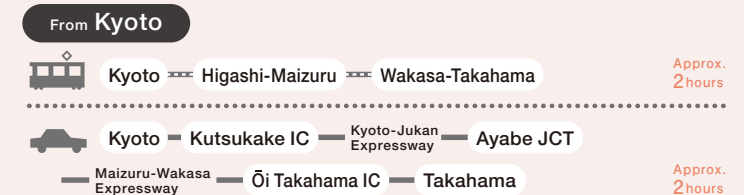
